CHAPTER V

HETHEL ATHLETICS FROM 1931 TO 1940

The athletic program for the next decade had an air of optimism. The football program had received more emphasis of late. Soccer and baseball were dropped because of their conflict with major seasonal sports. The varsity program included football, basketball, track and tennis. Bethel had a well-located gridiron, surrounded by a modern cinder track. The gymnasium and tennis courts were not too far away.

To keep pace with the time and to put athletics on a firmer financial basis, the authorities of the college consented to the wishes of the student body and community by installing equipment for lighting the athletic field. Newton business men and interested persons supported the venture financially. The lights were to pay for themselves in four years or the business men were to make good their pledges. The Newton High School team and the AJH Club team were scheduled to play their games under the lights. 1

The 1930 football team broke a losing streak of several years by winning two of the ten games played. The first game under the lights was played on September 30 against the Chilocco Indians. New bleachers had been constructed to seat approximately 1500. Coach Unruh was named head football coach, replacing Cliff Morgan.

Bethel College fielded her first golf team in 1933. Bethel lost a two-man team match with Bethany 256 to 263. Thomas Devlin and Francis Dotson played on the Bethel team. 15

The tennis team participated in several matches. However, the results of two matches were all that could be found. McPherson defeated Bethel 0 to 6 and Bethel placed third in a round robin tournament with McPherson and Bethany. Bethany was the winner. Kenneth Sparrow and Ted Pankratz received varsity awards. 16

The track team, led by Don Kennison and Art Landis, was not successful in winning meets but did give the opposition a good contest.

Landis did not lose a two-mile race during the season. Kennison set new school marks in the high jump (5' 11") and in the pole vault (11' 7 3/4"). Letters were granted to Dave Bergen, Wesley Cunningham,

1934-1935

Bethel holds opponents to one touchdown. Shutting out opponents in eight successive games was the outstanding record compiled by the 1934 Bethel eleven. This was an unusual accomplishment in Graymaroon gridiron history. In an evenly fought opener, McPherson scored the only touchdown scored against Bethel all season. Bethel lost the opener and then went on to defeat eight opponents. These opponents were held scoreless while the Graymaroons amassed a total of 115 points, recognized as the best record of any college team in Kansas.

Threshing stone adopted as official symbol of Bethel. It was a chilly morning on November 16, 1934, when the student body gathered around the Science Hall steps to adopt the new emblem. Mose Stucky, student council president, spoke these words as the student body dedicated the emblem: "This threshing stone, hewn out of solid rock, has been chosen as the emblem of Bethel College. It symbolizes certain fundamental characteristics of this school: the pioneering spirit, simplicity of life, faith and stability, solidarity of character." 26

Sunflower Conference organized. The Sunflower Conference was organized with Bethel, Friends and Sterling as charter members. Championships were awarded in football, basketball, track and tennis. An annual Play Day was held each spring with the student bodies of the member schools participating in various recreational activities. A picnic lunch was served at noon and the track meet and tennis tourna-

A well-rounded program. The program inaugurated by Otto Uhruh, director of athletics, was a well-rounded program of same athletics. Each student had a place in the athletic program that included football, basketball, track, tennis and intramurals. In addition to the two years of required physical training, the physical education department sponsored a program of athletics within the school. The Sunflower Conference Play Day was another feature of the athletic program. In this whole day of playing, every student had the opportunity of participation in some form of physical exercise. 33

1935-1936

One-third of Bethel's men in football uniform. The largest squad in the history of Bethel reported to Coaches Unruh and Morgan in the fall of 1935. One-third of the men enrolled were issued uniforms which numbered fifty-four. Andy Douglass was captain of the Graymaroons

Club and the campus Letter Club closer together; and (4) to have a
project for the campus Letter Club. This was set up to be an annual

1937-1938

Wheat Bowl classic. Homecoming in 1937 was honored with the inauguration of the first annual Wheat Bowl Festival. This was to commemorate the fact that it was the Mennonite forefathers who introduced the Turkey red wheat into America. The Wheat Bowl football game was to be an annual event.

The football team of 1937 set a new record in the number of squad members. Sixty-one men reported to Coaches Unruh and Morgan.

John Schrag and Charles Tubbs were elected co-captains. The season record was four wins and three defeats. The <u>Topeka Daily Capital</u> recognized Charlie Tubbs for the third consecutive year. He was given honor-

The Graymaroons played twenty-two games during the 1938-1939 basketball season. Twelve games were won and ten lost. In Kansas Conference play Bethel placed fifth with a four and eight record. Roy Hoff was third leading scorer in the Conference with 313 points and an average of 14.2 points per game. He was elected to the All-Conference second team. Wayne Catlin and Chester Unruh received honorable mention
