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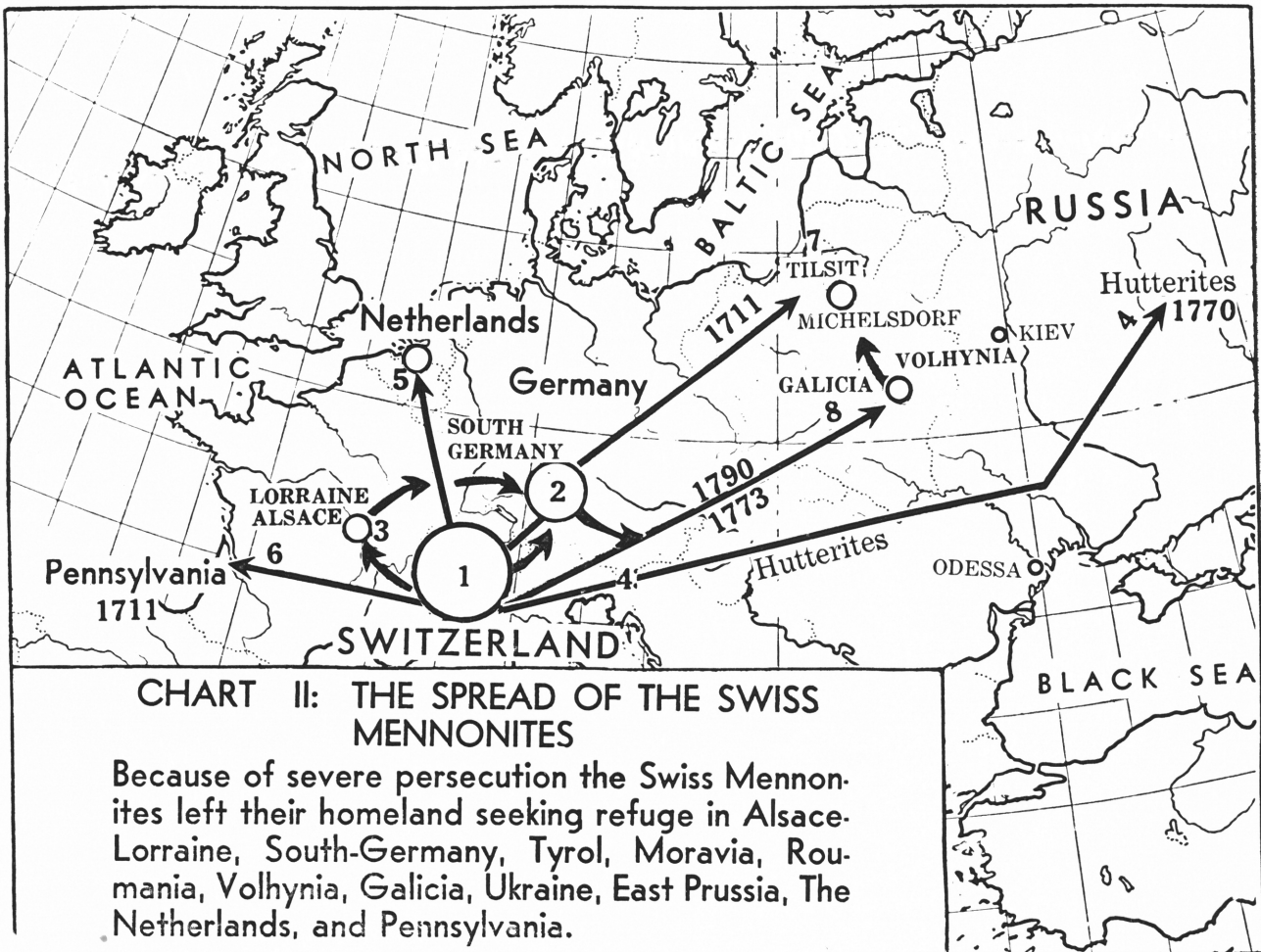
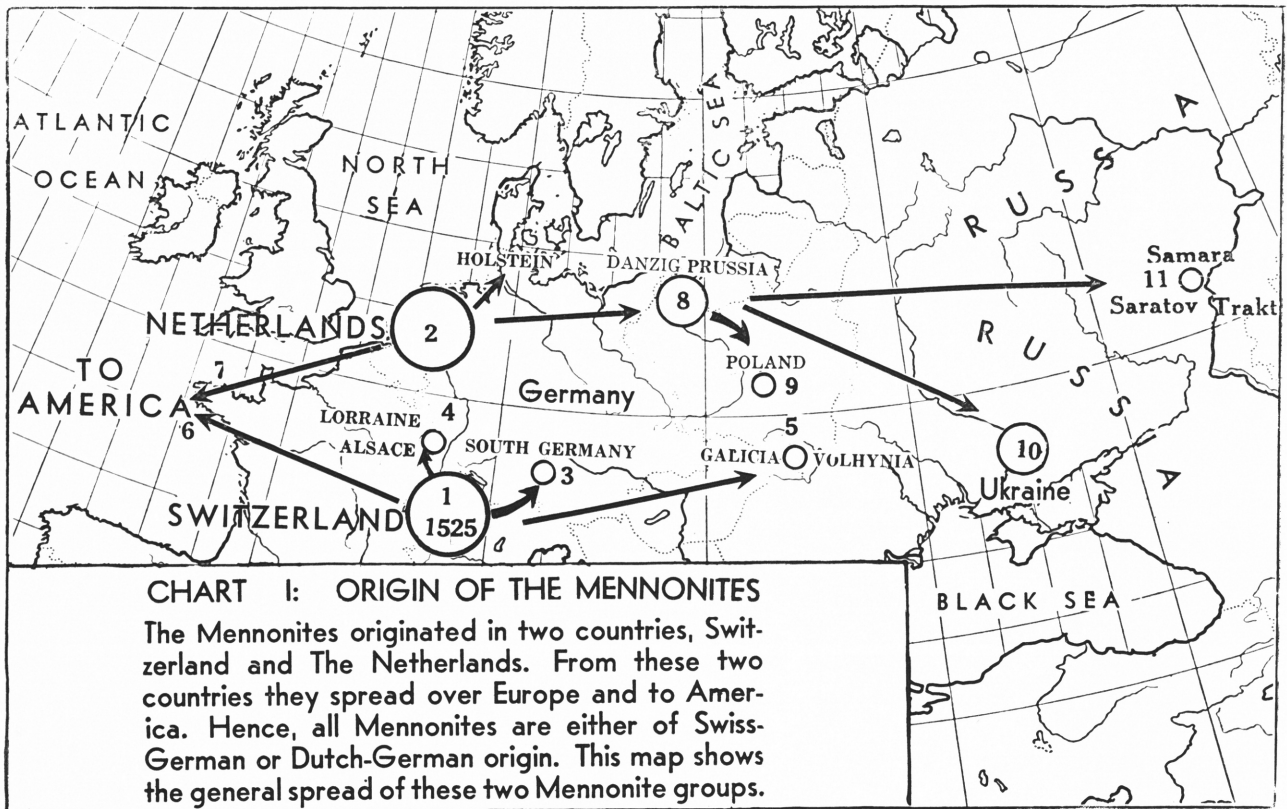
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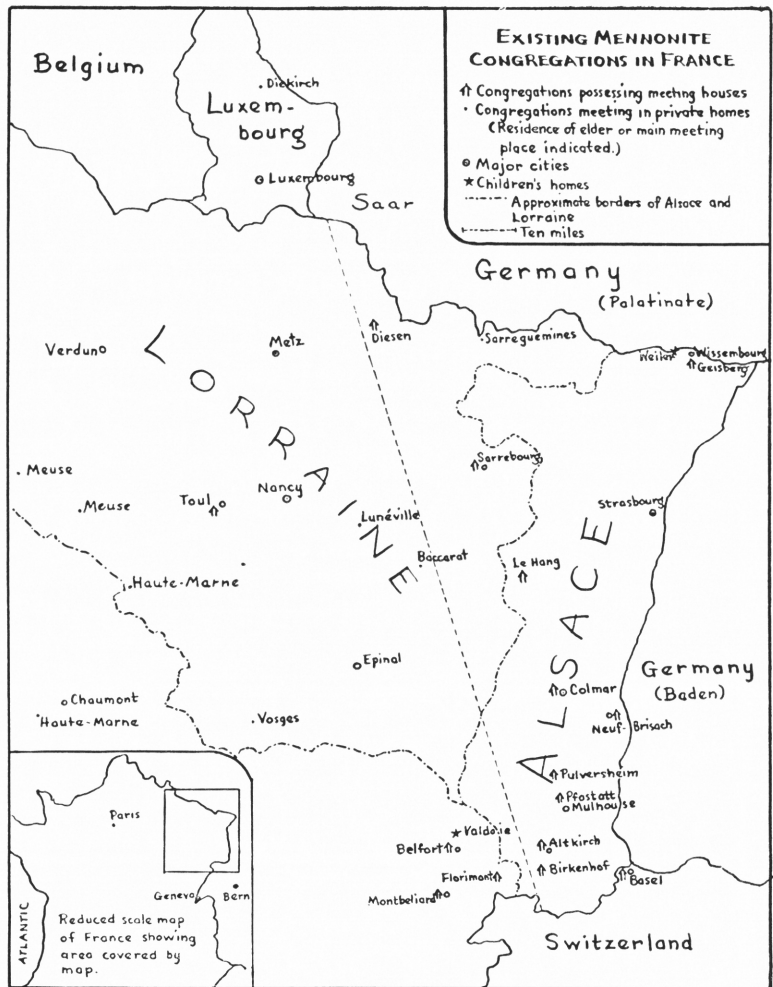


Mennonites in Western Europe Today

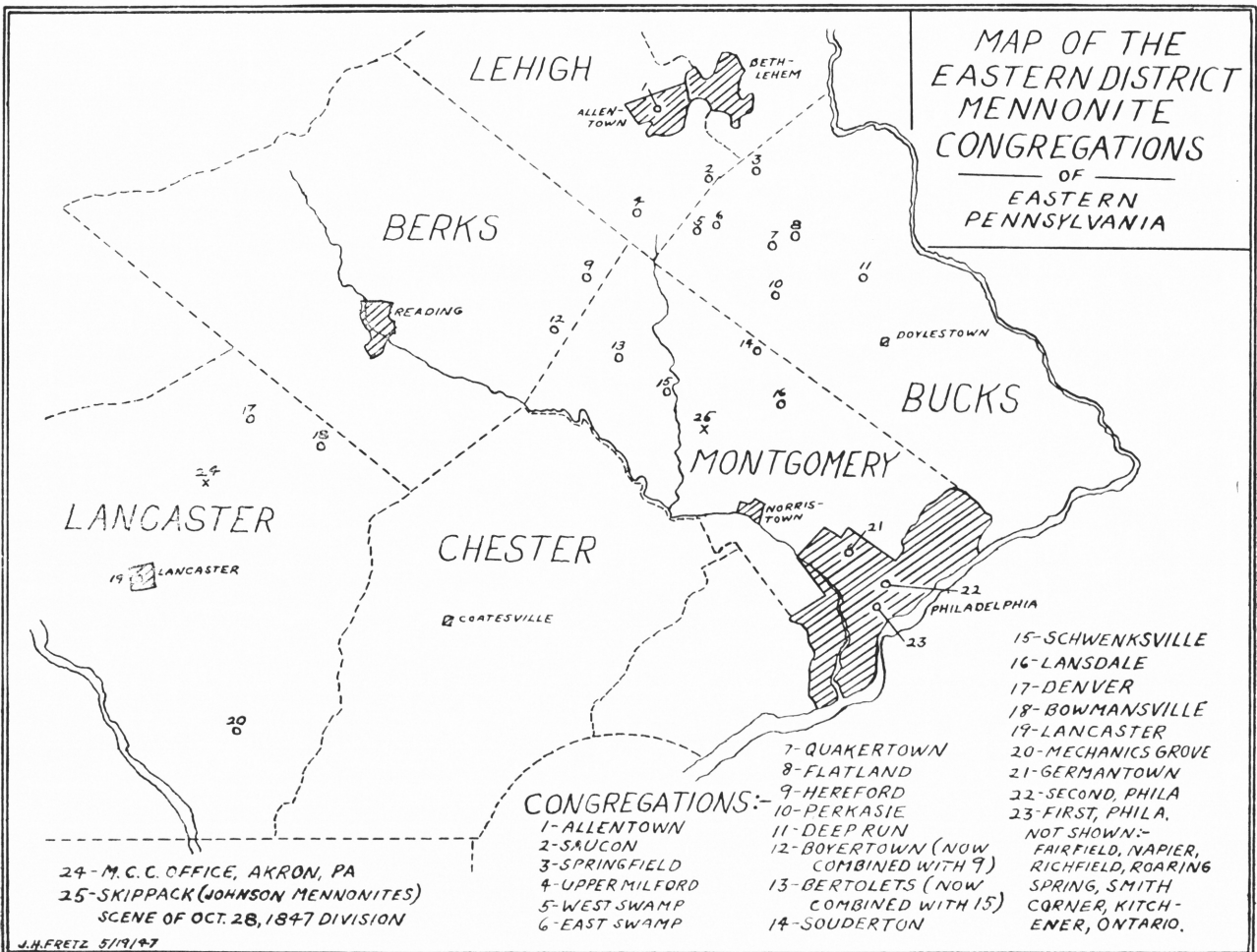


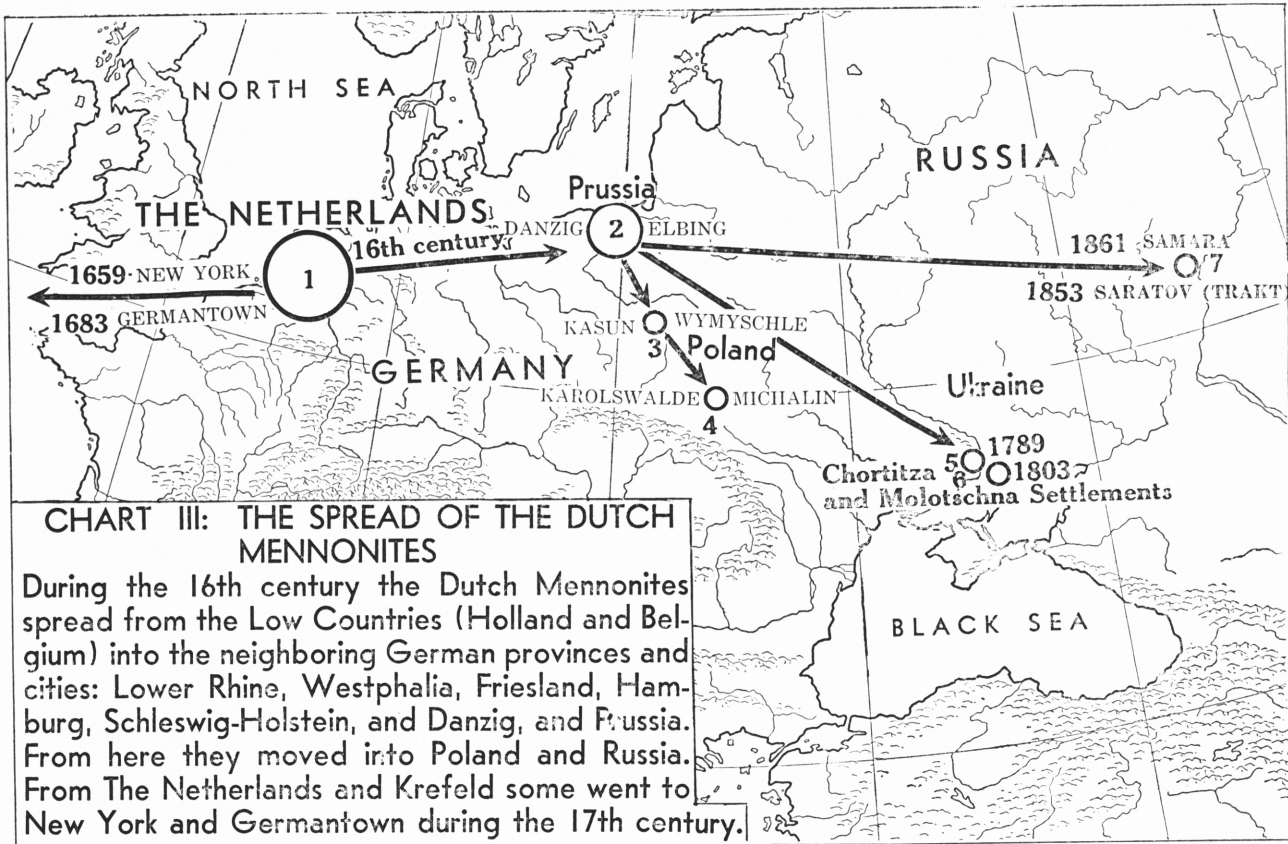
Mennonites in Alsace and Lorraine, France

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Mennonite congregations of the Vistula Delta

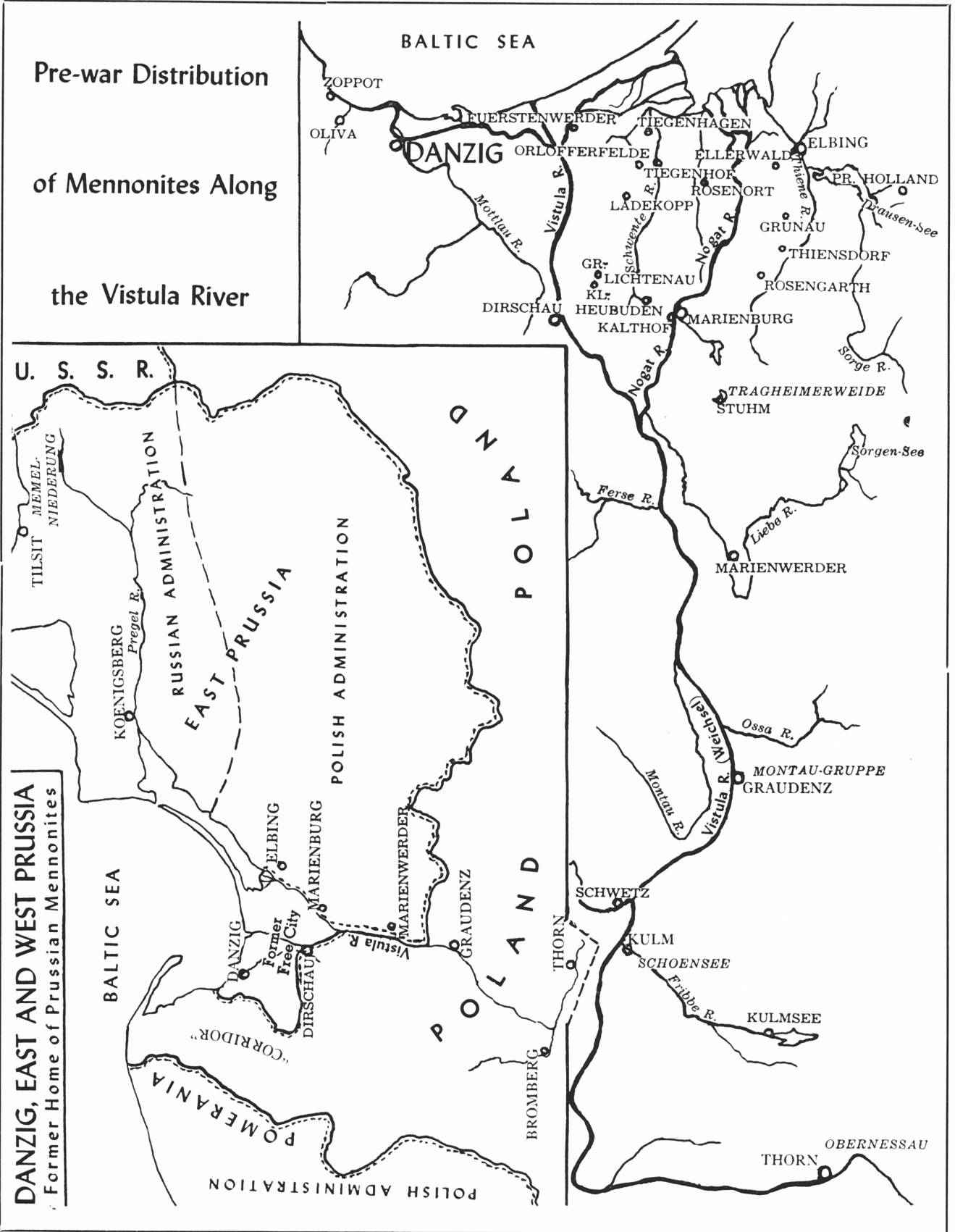


CHART IV: THE SPREAD OF THE MENNONITES IN RUSSIA

Within 150 years Mennonites spread over European and Asiatic Russia establishing some fifty settlements with a population of some 120,000; in 400 villages and estates, covering a land surface of 5,816 square miles (equal to the state of Connecticut).

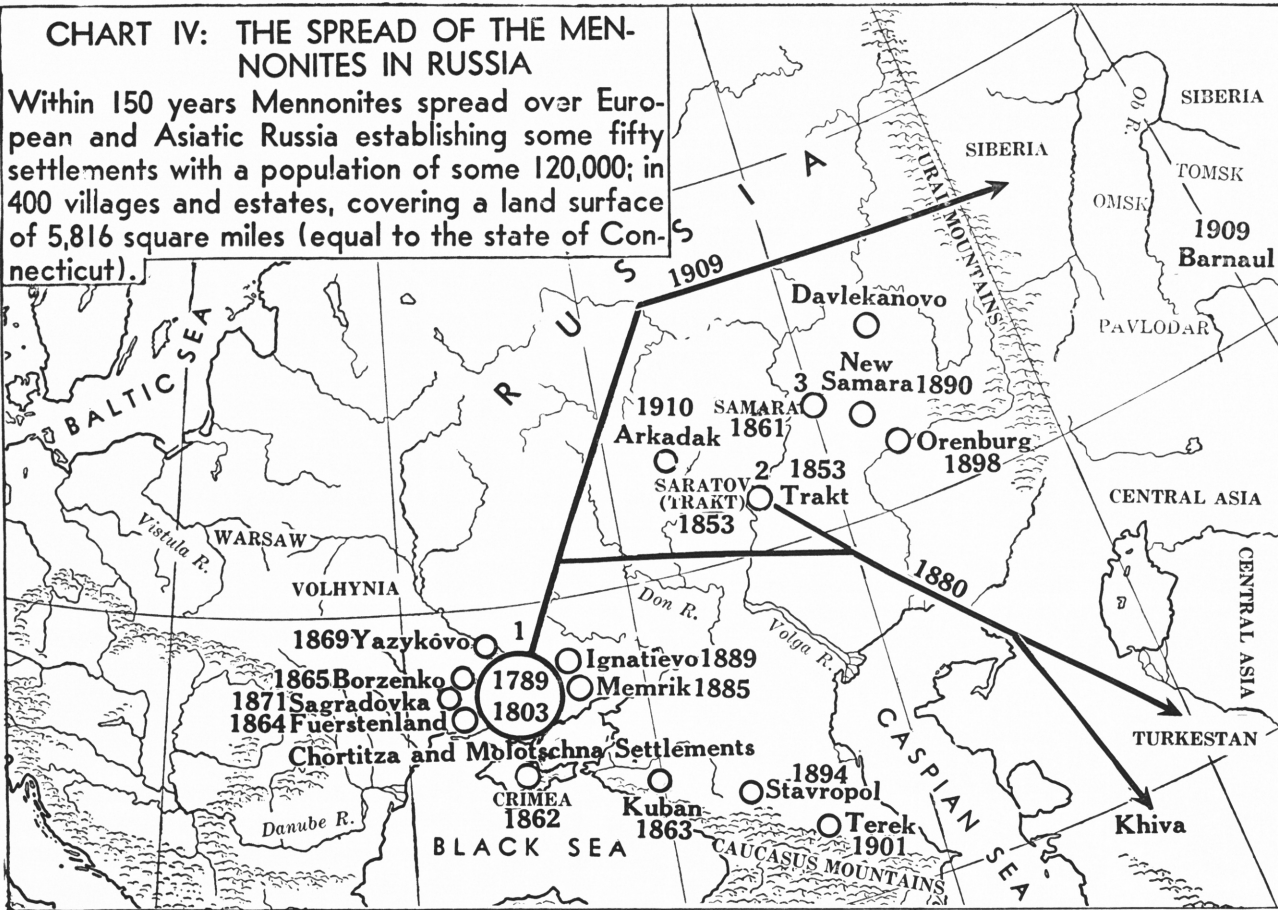
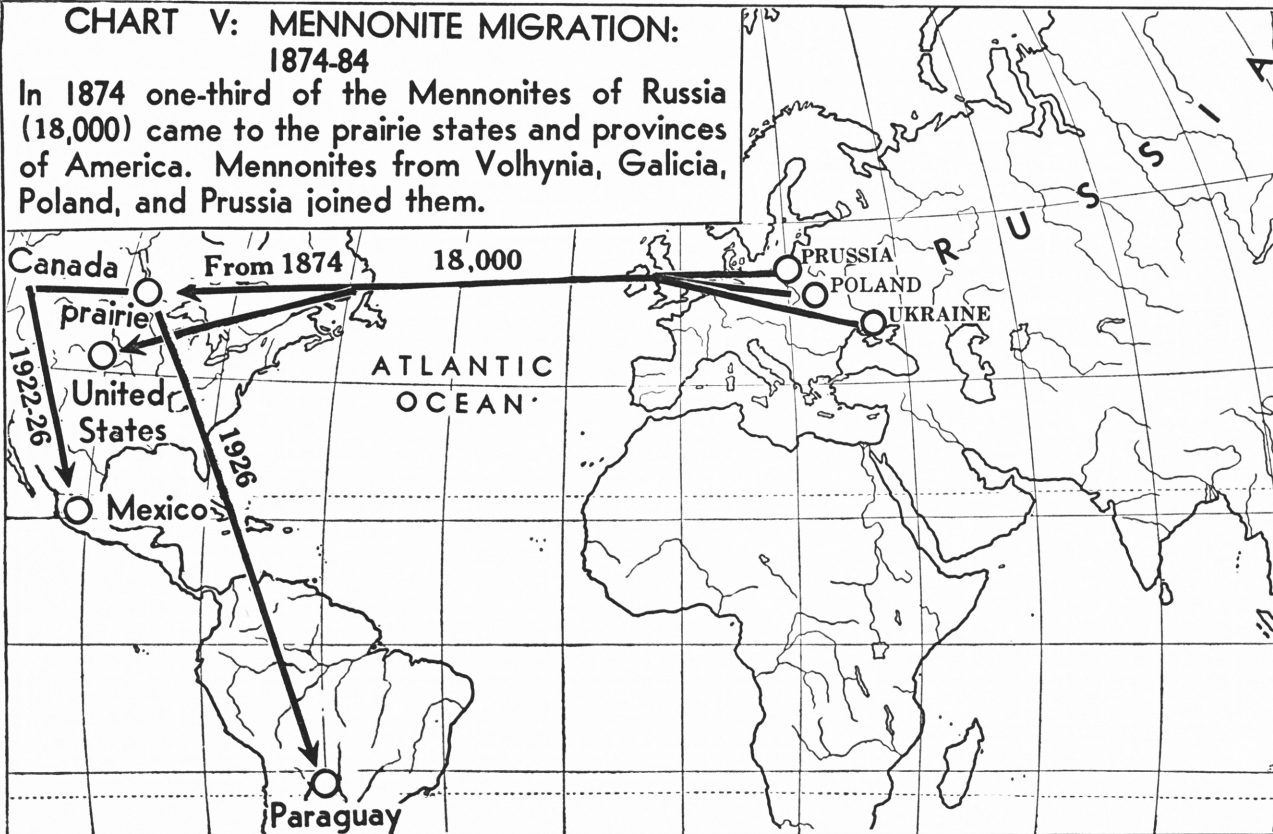
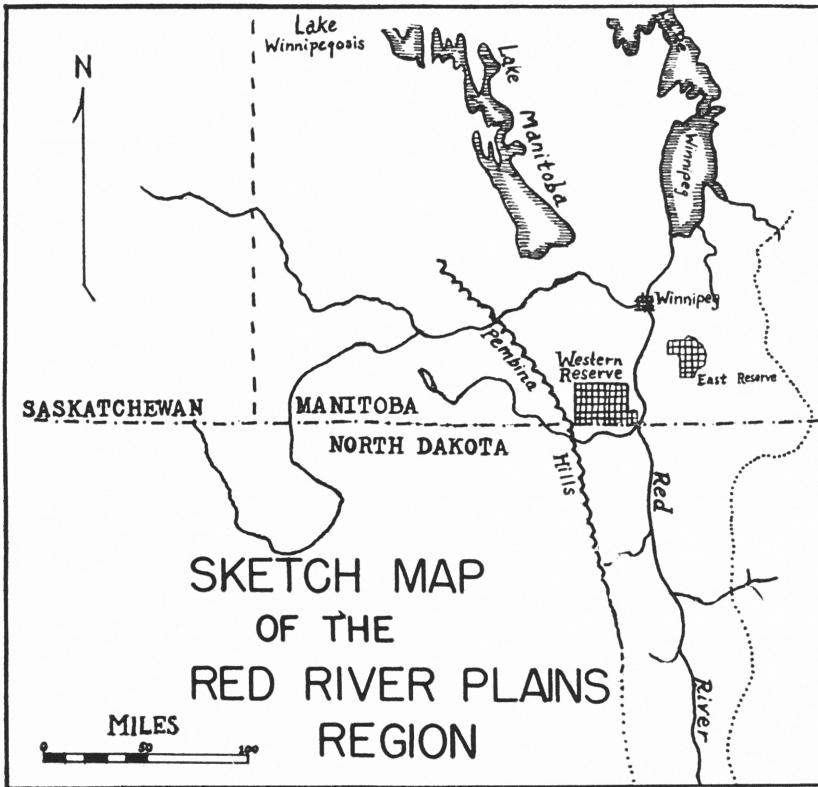


CHART V: MENNONITE MIGRATION: 1874-84

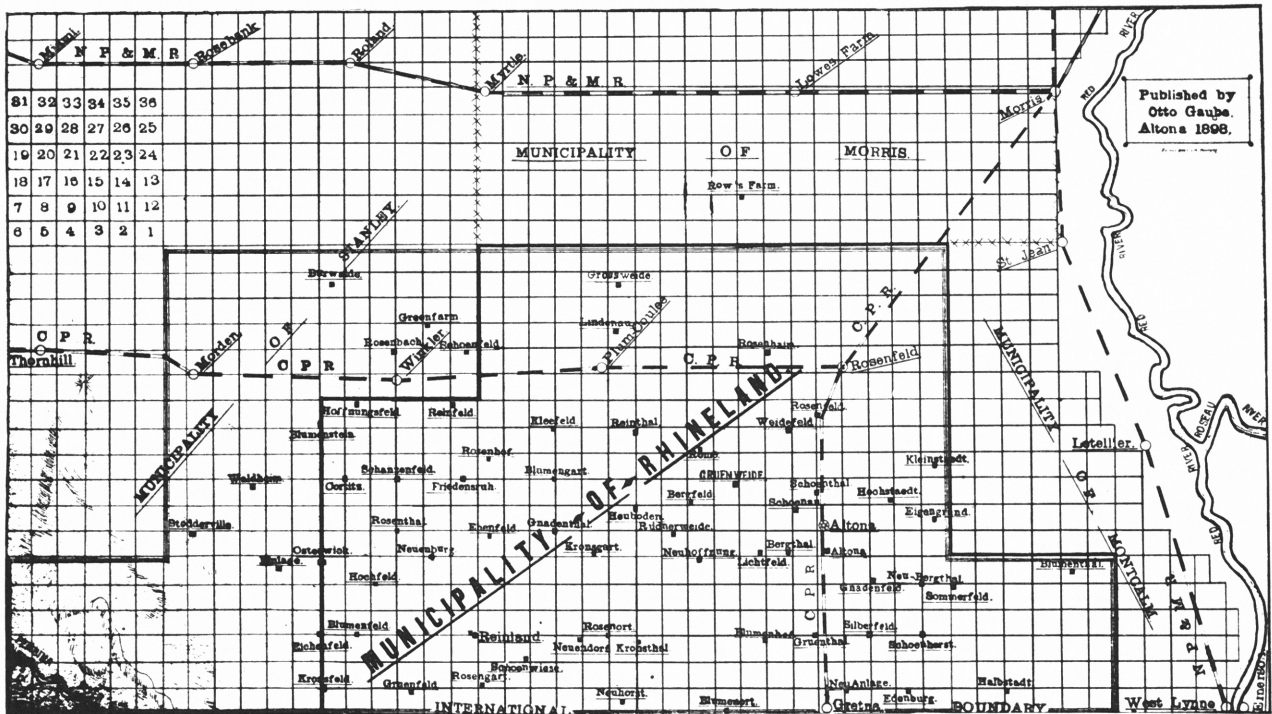
In 1874 one-third of the Mennonites of Russia (18,000) came to the prairie states and provinces of America. Mennonites from Volhynia, Galicia, Poland, and Prussia joined them.





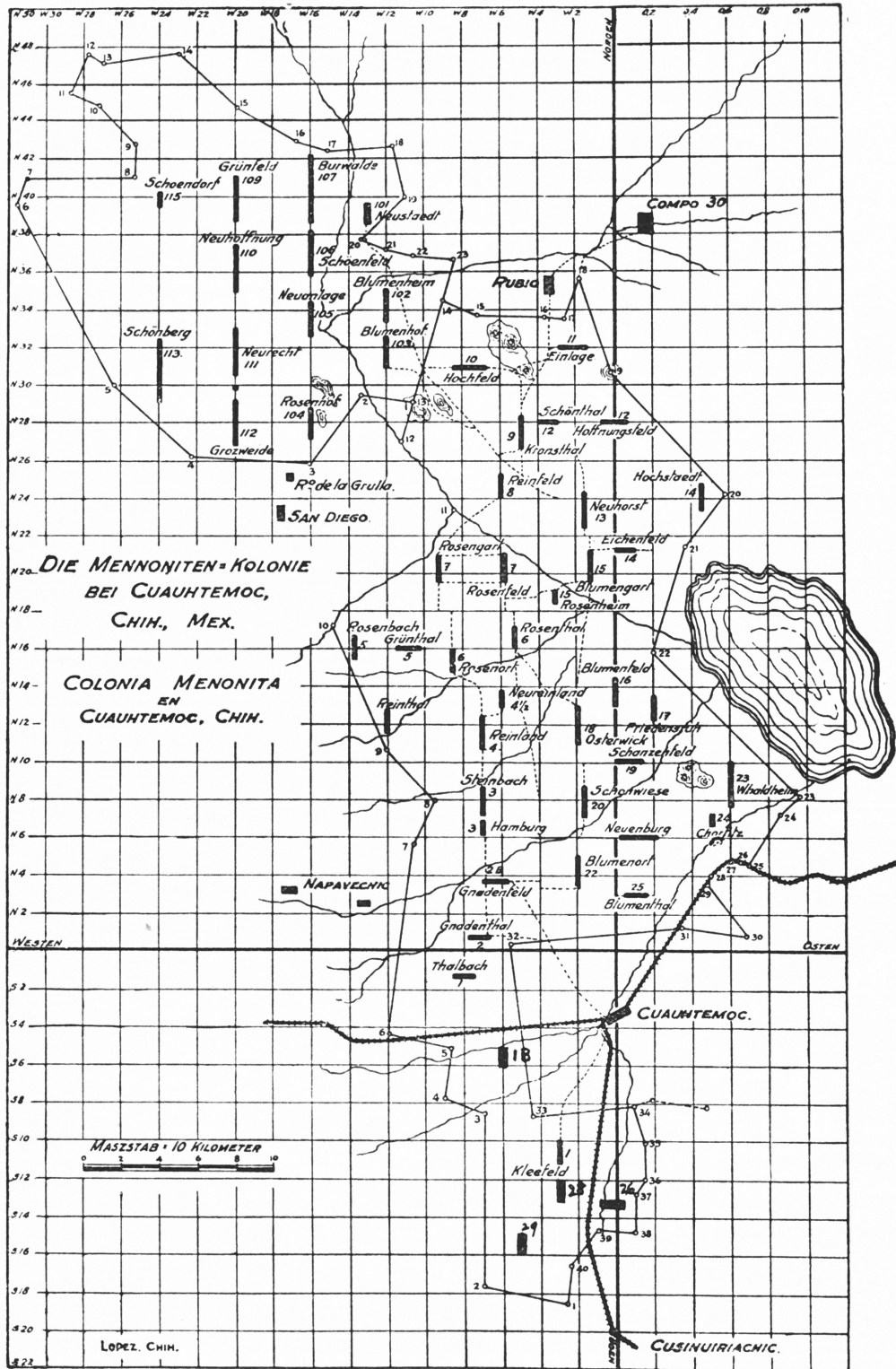
Mennonites from Russia settled, after 1874, in the prairie states and provinces of the USA and Canada.

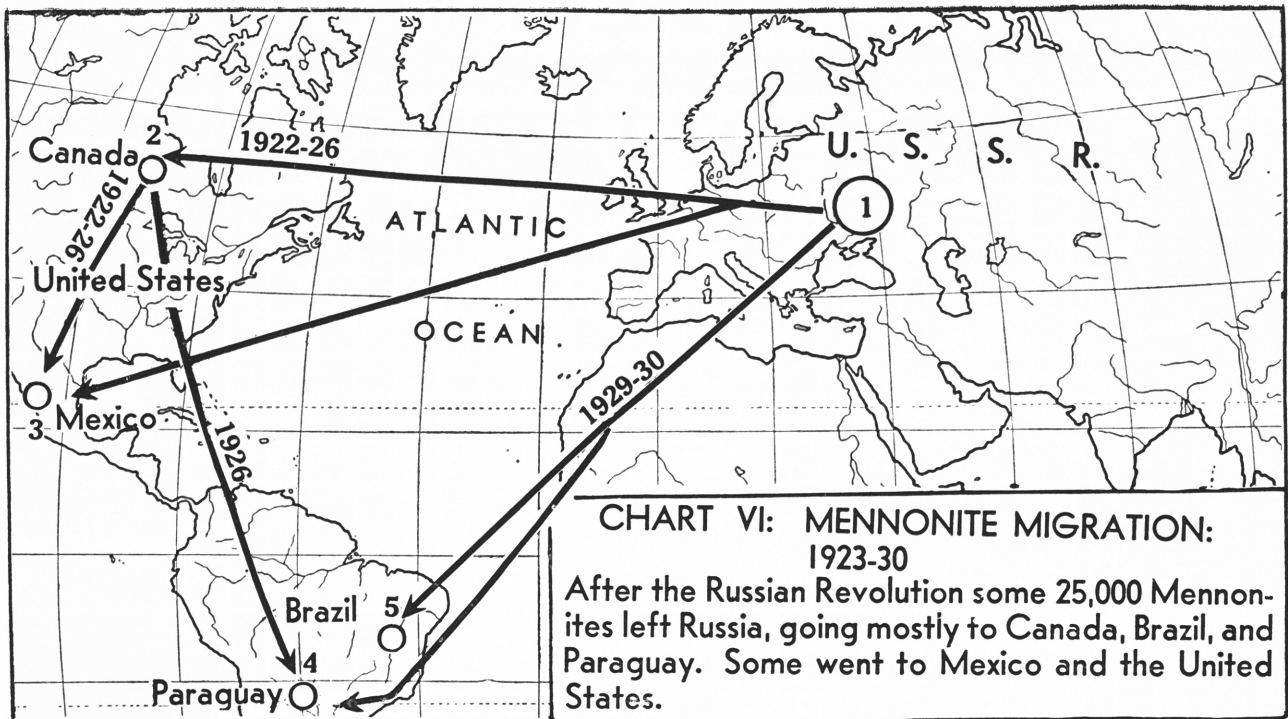
Top shows the east and west reserves in Manitoba where Mennonites settled. Bottom shows the west reserve Mennonite villages as of 1898.

The Mennonites of Mexico came from Manitoba and Saskatchewan and settled in Mexico after World War I



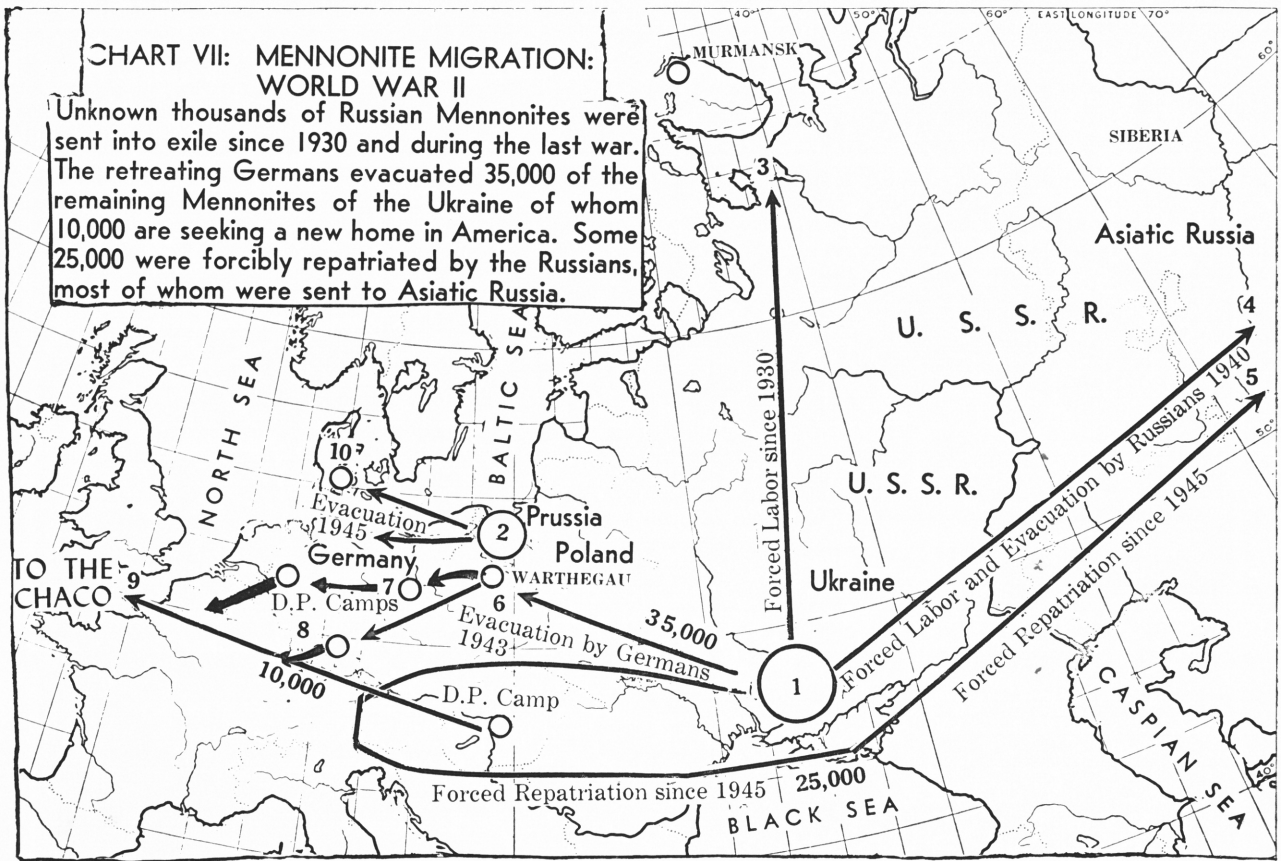


Distribution of all Mennonites of North America, 1946.
