*** LABOR COLLEGE ***

The Colorado Springs Labor College will open Sept. 27 with a variety of classes. There will be a \$2.00 enrollment fee which must be paid when registering for the courses on the 26th or 27th. There will be two periods of classes--7:30 to 8:30 and 8:30 to 9:30. Some of the courses that will be offered are shorthand, corrective English, You and your child, book reviewing, speech, radio speaking, retail selling, bookkeeping, Spanish, current events, aircraft welding, machine shop practice, aircraft sheet metal, radio, World peace, etc. As in past years the camp will furnish transportation to the classes provided you enroll.
