BIBLE STUDY WEEK

Rev. J. J. Plenert, pastor of the First Mennonite Church in Philadelphia, will be with us from Oct. 8 to the 15th. He was formerly a minister in Hutchinson, Kans. and served as student pastor at the West Zion Church in Moundridge. He has been active in young peoples work, home missions, orphans aid, and the World's Christian Endeavor Union. During his stay here, Rev. Plenert will conduct a series of 45-minute Bible classes probably on Acts 1 to 10. Also he will serve us with 3 or 4 additional talks on the central message of the Mennonites--the Bible. Plans are to have the classes on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday evenings. We urge you to plan to attend the classes and bring your wives. Rev. Plenert will speak to us on both Sundays during his stay.

NEW MATRON

According to Albert Gaeddert, Mrs. Linschoid will return to Colorado Springs to be matron again. She was matron here for two years early in the camps' history. She is due to arrive here between Oct. 5 and 11 and will possibly be here over the weekend. We have no word regarding a dietitian. Rev.
