The morning found approximately 43% of the mon unable to work, The crews did not go out. The "untouched" were mustered in on the overhead jobs or given a weed outting job. Special tables were set up for the ailing. Classes were cancelled for the evening. The Health Officer was not able to ascertain the exact cause of this epidemic but suggested it might be the frosh fruit, the milk, the flies, etc. On Tuesday the crews were patched up with replacements and sent out to work. By this time everyone seems to have recovered
