And there was misery in the land of Templeton Gap. The plague hit camp on Sunday afternoon and spread like wild fire. Evidently some part of the food that was eaten consistently changed direction once it reached the stomach regions causing men to feed the proverbial fish (or heaving). By the evening hosts of men were comforting each other in the bath house and relating how it had "hit" them. Married men were returning to camp VOLUNTARILY. One patient consulted Doc Harms and as he was fixing up a concoction of paragoric, the doc politely excused himself, rushed for the door, and one could hear sounds of strangulation, etc. When he returned he immediately fixed an extra dose for himself and joined the invalids. The night was hectic. Some races were lost--others were successful. The conservative members slept with a fire bucket at their side.

The morning found approximately 45% of the men unable to work. The crews did not go out. The "untouched" were mustered in on the overhead jobs or given a weed cutting job. Special tables were set up for the ailing. Classes were cancelled for the evening. The Health Officer was not able to ascertain the exact cause of this epidemic but suggested it might be the fresh fruit, the milk, the flies, etc. On Tuesday the crews were patched up with replacements and sent out to work. By this time everyone seems to have recovered.

### SUNDAY MORNING

Rev. Rogers of the Spanish Mission in Colorado Springs will bring the morning message. He is a former missionary to Venezuela, South America and will tell something of the work there. As a result of the war he was not able to return to his mission field so he accepted the post at the Spanish Mission. The morning collection will be for the Near East Relief Work carried on by the MCC. Sunday School will be at 10:00 and the Old Testament Study Class will again meet in the lounge.

### PROJECT EDUCATION
