SLIDE PROGRAM

The set of slides which will be shown Sunday have been arranged especially for C.P.S. men. They go back as far as the Reformation and the early Mennonites and come to Contemporary Mennonites. You will find this a simple and interesting way of informing yourself about your heritage. There are 100 slides falling into the following divisions:

- Reformation---Covering the Roman Catholic Church, Luther, and Zwingli.
- Swiss Brethren Reformation---Early leaders and early followers.
- Dutch Mennonites---Dirck Philips, Menno Simons, Early Dutch Scenes, and Present-day Dutch scenes are presented.
- Persecution and Martyrdom---Deals with Martyrs' Mirror and Ausbund.
- Migrations---This includes the migrations to Russia, Kansas, Paraguay, C.O.'s in Russia, early scenes in U. S. and Westward movement.
- Contemporary Mennonites---Showing the Menn. population in America, some of their contributions in missions, publications, hospitals, schools, C.P.S., and relief work.

BELTON ECHOS

Elmer Neufeld writes the following: Being in the Glacier National Park, we are practically surrounded with trees and mountains. There is also a lot of wild life around here--deer, bears, moose, elk, etc. Some of the side camps report that the porcupines are such a bother that the rangers gave them permission to kill a few.

There were over 200 men in camp here a while after the Springs and Medaryville groups came, but they have been straggling out to side camps till there are only about 100 of a little over left in base camp. Six of our bunch, Vernon Decker, Wilbur Dester, Kenneth Krahbiel, Floyd Miller, Rudy Neufeld, and Lee Reimer are at the Dutch Creek side camp doing trail work and fire suppression. Paul Landis is out at a four men side camp near Canada. Jesse Diener has a real suction job at St. Mary side camp. He is working as telephone and radio operator in cooperation with two or three women. Roy Jantz, Beno Habenicht, James Rother, Herman Quiring, and Reuben Schmidt were sent out to Yellowstone where they are doing blister rust control work. Harlo Janzen is out with a trail crew that is going to build a look-out on Heavens Peak. Supplies are taken up by pack mule. "Dutch" Grundman is at the Belly River side camp doing trail work. This leaves only five of us in base camp. Hiram and Henry Engle and Elmer Miller are working with a blister rust control crew. Clarence Yoder is now orderly for two of the dorms. I have been working in the engineers' office at park headquarters. I do some typing and keep records. ---Elmer Neufeld.
