### GOOD READING

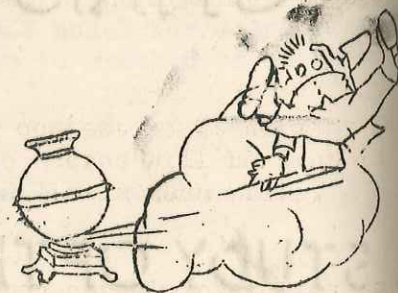
