DO YOU PLAN TO FINISH HIGH SCHOOL?

The American Council on Education has recommended a series of tests which are designed to determine the general educational development of a person. The Council is aware of the fact that Conscription and the War have interrupted the formal education of many men and women, especially of those who were drafted. Nevertheless, the general education of these people has continued as they have read and developed while in service. A series of tests on the high school level is now available to men in CPS. There are five tests: specifically in the fields of (1) Self-empression; (2) the Social Studies; (3) the Natural Sciences; (4) Literary Materials; and (5) Mathematics. If a person is able to make a satisfactory score on all five of these tests, he can be admitted into college, even if he has never completed his high school work. In other words, it is now possible for a person to graduate from high school by means of passing these tests, which will score his general educational development.
