SAFETY MEETINGS

Beginning December 1st, the camp will hold a thirty minute safety meeting each Wednesday morning from 7:30 A.M. to 8:00 A.M. This meeting will take the place of the regular safety meetings that have been held the second and fourth Wednesday of each month. Men on farms must notify their employers.

ANDREAS REQUEST FOR TRANSFER APPROVED

The MCC has approved the requested transfer of Carl Andreas to the Gulfport, Mississippi, unit. Only the approval of Selective Service is now needed in order to make it official all around.

CHRISTMAS FURLOUGHS

At a camp council meeting on Tuesday night it was recommended that those who wish to take Christmas furloughs make application with the director's office at once. It was further recommended that in the event that the number of applicants for furlough exceed the number allowed by Selective Service, that a plan with the following suggestions be followed, if the camp approve:

- (1) that December 8th be the deadline for making application for a holiday furlough; no application can be accepted after that date;
- (2) that the holiday season be divided into Christmas furloughs and New Year furlough, in order that all men who cannot take the first can go home for a New Year furlough;
- (3) that the names of applicants for furlough be arranged in an order of priority, based upon:
 - (a) the number of years the applicant has been in camp without a Christmas furlough; and,
 - (b) whether the applicant was home for Christmas last year.
- (4) that those persons who cannot be given Christmas furlough, be given New Year furlough; and, that the persons with lowest priority for Christmas furlough return in time in order to allow those who can take only a New Year furlough to leave.

So far the demand for Christmas furloughs has not been great enough to make it necessary to put a priority plan such as is suggested above into effect.

DON'T FORGET the all-camp social, to be held in the assembly hall, 8:00 P.M. on Friday night, November 30th. Everyone is invited,—campers, wives and families of campers; dairy farmers, wives and families of dairy farmers. Refreshments will be served in the dining hall after the program. This is a return-social, which the men are giving the women. A previous announcement stated that the program would begin at 7:30 P.M., but this has been changed to 8:00 P.M.
