

I remember the many times you carefully taught me to love my enemies and to do good to them that have me and I am thankful that you have not succumbed to propaganda and lowered your standards. It would be a great disappointment to me if you would give in to the public opinion. Mother, had you given in, I would have to question several things you taught me but now my confidence in you has deeponed. As I think of the associated I had when in the public school and how their mothers taught them to love their enemies and do good to them that hated them and how they now say it is alright to go against those principles when the government says we must, I can see the ruin of our nation comingo. If mothers let down these principles their sons will not have confidence in their other teachings. I'do not spouk of the coos where the mothers did not teach them these beliefs.

Mother, I feel I will come back after the war is over with a stronger character and deeper appreciation for what you have done for me. I am sure I am not the only one that feels this way. There are times it is very discouraging when on the surface the routine of work geems unimportant. If it were not for the peace principle that you taught me I would have given up long ago and joined the army.


