

is a reality! The military forces have ceased waging war; they are striving now to draw up proper peace terms. Will we have an enduring, a lasting peace or must we engage in warfare every few years? We must endeavor to make this a lasting peace. What is our greatest concern?

No one can deny the uselessness and wastefulness of war. One can not overlook the three hundred billions of dollars spent by the United States along in waging this terrible war, but the cost in human lives is the tragic part of war. Why must so many lives be lost every few years?

With the coming of the atomic bomb we have seen the most devastating and destructive force ever created by man. We have seen one of the most inhumane acts of man. Many of the inventions with great possibilities in peace are used as destructive forces in war. The United States is called a Christian nation—yet we have used the most uncivilized, barbaric method of killing yet devised. Nations have agreed that poison gas should not be used in warfare—why then use a weapon more destructive and against which man has absolutely no protection?

We in Civilian Public Service have tried to remove ourselves apart from this war. Are we going to be held blameless for this ruthless killing? How can we say this? Somewhere we have failed! We have not radiated the Teachings of Christ prior to the beginning of the war. Maybe our lives in Civilian Public Service are showing the world a better way of life--if not, we have failed again. If we are not a testimony, the true spirit of pacifism is lacking. As peace becomes a reality we must keep the Teachings of Christ and the ideals of the peace churches uppermost in our minds and hearts. We must bring these teachings to men in authority so that the whole nation may realize the true meaning of the Teachings of Christ.

What is the solution for the making of a lasting peace? Perhaps it is possible to throw out several points about which we can seriously think.

Certainly as long as militarists rule the earth we shall not have peace. As long as men are interested only in material gain we shall have war. Men who have "Peace" in their hearts should be allowed to prepare the peace terms. Peace time conscription must not become a reality. Rev. Regier in his Sunday morning sermon suggested the adoption of the Office of Secretary of Peace in place of the Office of Secretary of War. Man must learn to exercise true love before we shall have a warless world. Man must learn to exercise, in the true spirit, tolerance, patience, trust, forgiveness, humility, etc.

Whatever the best method of obtaining a lasting peace, we still have a task to do. This is no time to relax our efforts. We cannot sit back and wonder when we will obtain releases; but we must put our all into the peace testimony and the averting of another such disasterous war. May our prayers and efforts be to that end.




newly born son, Wendel Dwight, born August 31. On August 30, William F. Snyder became father of Duane Eugene.

With the end of the war in Japan Selective Service conforming with other government agencies reduced the number of working hours for CPS men first to 44 hours per week and later to 40 hours. This will allow men to be free from project work on Saturday as well as Sunday. Week end leaves lasting two days may be granted. In addition to the shortened week Selective Service recognized certain holidays such as Armistice Day, Thanksgiving Day, New Year's Day, 4th of July, and other days which heretofore had been working days.

Selective Service expects to begin demobilization of Conscientious Objectors on October 15, providing Congress does not pass the Winstead Bill. The future direction of demobilization is too indefinite at this time for any clarification.
